protection of the waterways from the pollution of balloons. Ron Meischker, Harbor Master, recommended that the Governing Body adopted the ordinance unanimously to safeguard the water and the marine life. Council President McGuigan mentioned that the Green Team is also a supporter of the ordinance.

No. 7 of 2017

An Ordinance

Amending and Supplementing Somers Point Municipal Code Chapter 117
"Disorderly Conduct" to Add Section 117-15 "Release of Balloons" and Repealing all Ordinances Inconsistent Therewith

Whereas, environmental groups and animal protection activists say released balloons often land in the ocean, where marine mammals, turtles and other sea life can become entangled in them or ingest them and die; and

Whereas, birds, turtles and other animals commonly mistake balloons for food, which can harm or even kill them and in addition, many animals can become entangled in balloon strings, which can strangle them or hurt their feet and hands; and

Whereas, the UK Marine Conservation Society has reported that an infant sperm whale met its death in New Jersey in 1985 as a result of ingestion of an inflated mylar balloon which had lodged in its intestines and died of starvation. Also that the following species, all of which occur in the North East Atlantic waters off the UK, have been reported with latex balloons in the digestive systems:

Con-nnon Dolphin

Risso's Dolphin

Loggerhead Turtle

Leatherback Turtle

Blue Shark

Northern Fulmar

All seven species of marine turtle are near extinction and many tuffles of two species in particular, the Loggerhead and Leatherback turtle, have been found with balloons in their guts, probably having mistaken them for jellyfish, their preferred prey; and

Whereas, each of those species are also present along the coast of New Jersey; and

Whereas, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service reported on August 5, 2015 that '. more than a hundred balloons had recently been collected at Edwin B. Forsythe National Wildlife Refuge in New Jersey at a cleanup, and that's just the number that made it to this one particular beach." and

Whereas, it is the policy of the governing body of the City of Somers Point to protect the general health and safety of the general public and of the environment.

Now, therefore, it is hereby ORDAINED by the Common Council of the City of Somers Point, County of Atlantic, State of New Jersey that:

SECTION 1: Amendment to Somers Point Municipal Code Chapter 1 17.

Chapter 117 of the Somers Point Municipal Code is amended to add Section 117-15 "Release of Balloons" as follows:

Section 1 17-15 Release of Balloons.

- A. Purpose and Intent: This Section is adopted in order to protect the environment, particularly the wildlife, and the health, safety and well-being of persons and property by prohibiting the release of helium balloons into the atmosphere, including latex and mylar, as it has been determined that the release of balloons inflated with lighter-than-air gases pose a danger and nuisance to the environment, particularly to wildlife and marine animals so as to constitute a public nuisance and may pose a threat to the safety of its inhabitants and their property.
- B. Prohibited Releases: It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to intentionally release, organize the release, or intentionally cause to be released balloons inflated with a gas that is lighter than air within the City of Somers Point city limits, except for:
 - (a) Balloon released by a person on behalf of a governmental agency or pursuant to a governmental contract for scientific or meteorological purposes.
 - (b) Hot air balloons that are recovered after launching. (c) Balloons released and kept indoors.

SECTION 2: All other provisions of Chapter 117 not modified or amended by this Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect and shall apply to this amendment upon the effective date of this Ordinance.

SECTION 3: All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistencies.

SECTION 4: Should any section, clause, sentence, phrase or provision or any item in any schedule of this ordinance be declared unconstitutional or invalid by a Court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the remaining portions of this ordinance.

The within Ordinance was introduced at a meeting of the Common Council of the City of Somers Point, County of Atlantic and State of New Jersey held on April 27, 2017 and will be

further considered for final passage after a public hearing thereon at a meeting of said Common Council on May 1 1, 2017.

An Ordinance

Amending and Supplementing Somers Point Municipal Code Chapter 212 "Sewers" to add an Article VIII "Military Deployment User Rate Discount" and Repealing all Ordinances Inconsistent Therewith

Whereas, Congress designated May as National Military Appreciation Month in 1999 to ensure the nation was given the opportunity to publically demonstrate their appreciation for the sacrifices and successes made by our service members - past and present; and Whereas, the governing body of the City of Somers Point joins in recognizing and honoring the United States Armed Forces; and

Whereas, service in the Armed Forces entails special hazards and demands extraordinary sacrifices from service members and their families; and

Whereas, the support of the families of service members enhances the effectiveness and capabilities of the Armed Forces;

Whereas, on November 14, 2016 Assembly Bill 3534 was passed by both the New Jersey Senate and the New Jersey House of Representatives and was signed into law by Governor Christie on January 9, 2017 amending N.J.S. 40A:26A-10.1 and granting the authority to any local unit operating a county or municipal sewerage facility to establish within its district rates or schedules which provide for a reduction, deferment without interest, or total abatement to any person who is enlisted in any branch of the United States Armed Forces to be effective during the period of time in which that person is deployed for active service in time of war; and

Whereas, the City of Somers Point does provide wastewater collection service through its Sewer Utility; and

Whereas, in order to support those military personnel and their families residing within the home to which sewer service is provided by the City this governing body deems it prudent to offer a discount in the amount of fifteen percent (15%) of the annual sewer user charge which shall be available to any resident who:

i) owns or is the leasee of the property to which sewer service is being provided and in whose name the service is listed for billing prior to and during the time of deployment;

- ii) is enlisted or actively serving in any branch of the United States Armed Forces;
- iii) who is deployed for active service in time of war; and
- iv) whose sewer billing is current at the time of the application if a lessee; and whose sewer billing and real estate tax payments are current at the time of the application if the owner of the property, and all remain current throughout the period of eligibility.

The request may be applied for by the military personnel or his or her spouse or immediate family member residing in the home on forms to be provided by the Somers Point Tax Collector and including a true copy of the deployment papers. No refunds or retroactive adjustments shall be made or applied by the City. The discount shall be in the form of a credit against future sewer bills commencing upon the effective date of approval by the Tax Collector.

Now, therefore, it is hereby **ORDAINED** by the Common Council of the City of Somers Point, County of Atlantic, State of New Jersey that:

SECTION 1: Amendment to Somers Point Municipal Code Chapter 212.

Chapter 212 of the Somers Point Municipal Code "Sewers" is amended to add an Article VIII "Military Deployment User Rate Discount" as follows:

Article VIII Military Deployment User Rate Discount.

Section 212-24 User Rate Discount.

Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained within Article V of Code Chapter 212:

- A) any person who is enlisted or actively serving in any branch of the United States Armed Forces and is deployed on active service during time of war shall be eligible to apply for a military discount in the amount of fifteen percent (15%) of the annual sewer user charge which shall be subject to proof of active service and which shall be pro-rated to apply from the date of approval of the request and thereafter only during the time of active service deployment during time of war.
- B) Application shall be made by the enlisted individual, his or her spouse, or a member of the military personnel's immediate family and shall be submitted on forms provided by the Somers Point Tax Collector accompanied by proof of active deployment and proof of ownership of the property by the service person to which sewer service is being provided at the time of and during the deployment or proof that the service person is the Lessee of a property who was named as the responsible party on the Somers Point Sewer bill prior to and during the time of deployment.
- C) An application for the Military User Charge Discount shall be filed for each calendar year and any person receiving the discount shall inform the Somers Point Tax Collector promptly upon the end of deployment.
- D) An application received during any calendar year shall be prorated from the effective date of approval through to the end of the calendar year; and any notice of termination of deployment shall likewise be prorated commencing upon the date of the end of deployment.

- E) There shall be no retroactive application accepted or retroactive discount given. The discount shall be applied in the form of a credit on future sewer bills commencing upon the effective date of approval by the Tax Collector.
- F) In order to be eligible all sewer billings, real estate taxes or other payments or assessments due to the City for which the service person lessee or owner is responsible shall be current; and shall continue to be current during deployment in order to continue to be eligible for the discount.

SECTION 2: Effective Date.

This Ordinance amendment shall be effective on the first day of June, 2017 and shall continue in full force and effect until amended or repealed by City Council action.

SECTION 3: All other provisions of Chapter 212 not modified or amended by this Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect and shall apply to this amendment upon the effective date of this Ordinance.

SECTION 4: All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistencies.

SECTION 5: Should any section, clause, sentence, phrase or provision or any item in any schedule of this ordinance be declared unconstitutional or invalid by a Court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the remaining portions of this ordinance.

Authorizing Tonnage Grant Application

WHEREAS, the Mandatory Source Separation and Recycling Act, P.L. 1987, c. 102, has established a recycling fund from which tonnage grants may be made to municipalities in order to encourage local source separation and recycling programs; and

WHEREAS, its the intent and spirit of the Mandatory Source Separation and Recycling Act to use the tonnage grants to develop new municipal recycling programs and to continue and expand existing programs; and

WHEREAS, the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection is promulgating recycling regulations to implement the Mandatory Source Separation and Recycling Act; and

WHEREAS, the recycling regulations impose on municipalities certain requirements as a condition for applying for tonnage grants, including, but not limited to, making and keeping accurate, verifiable records of materials collected and claimed by the municipality; and

WHEREAS, a resolution authorizing this municipality to apply for such tonnage grants will memorialize the commitment of this municipality to recycling and indicate the assent of City Council to the efforts undertaken by the municipality and the requirements contained in the Recycling Act and recycling regulations; and

WHEREAS, such a resolution should designate the individual authorized to ensure that the application is properly completed and timely filed.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Somers Point that the City of Somers Point hereby endorses the submission of a Municipal Recycling Tonnage Grant Application to the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection, Office of Recycling, and designates Wes Swain, City Administrator, and James Daugherty, Recycling Coordinator, to ensure that the said Application is properly filed.

Resolution No. 110

The resolution was adopted with a majority vote of those present with Councilman Smith voting no. Mayor Glasser indicated that the Atlantic County Mayor's Association brought this forth to support Atlantic County in suing the State on the constitutionality of the Pilot Program.

Resolution No. 110 of 2017

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE CITY OF SOMERS POINT IN THE COUNTY OF ATLANTIC, STATE OF NEW JERSEY TO JOIN THE COUNTY OF ATLANTIC AS A PARTY PLAINTIFF IN A LAWSUIT CHALLENGING THE CONSTITUTIONALITY OF THE CASINO PILOT LAW

WHEREAS, The City of Somers Point (the "Municipality") is a body politic of the State of New Jersey located within the County of Atlantic (the "County"); and

WHEREAS, the Municipality and all other constituent municipalities in the County follow uniform assessment and tax collection practices for all non-exempt real properties located within their borders, pursuant to the provisions of Title 54 of the New Jersey Statutes as authorized by the uniformity provisions of Article VIII of the New Jersey Constitution; and

WHEREAS, the County is a body politic operating as a County Executive form of government pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40:41A-27, et seq.; and

WHEREAS, the County levies taxes for its government services upon the owners of all real property located within the County which taxes are then assessed and collected by the Municipality and the other constituent municipalities within the County pursuant to the uniform standards of assessment and tax collection as referenced above; and

WHEREAS, in 2016 the New Jersey Legislature adopted and the Governor signed into law Senate Bill No. 1715 entitled the Casino Property Tax Stabilization Act (also known as the PILOT Bill), which established a program whereby Atlantic City casino gaming properties, as defined in the Act, are exempted from the uniform tax assessment standards which apply to all other properties located within the County; and

WHEREAS, the PILOT Bill removes the uniform methods of assessment and taxation from the Atlantic City casino gaming properties and exempts those properties from assessment and taxation for the next ten (10) years and establishes a set combined payment amount for Atlantic City casino gaming properties, which practice deviates from the uniformity provisions of Article VIII of the New Jersey Constitution; and

WHEREAS, the implementation of the PILOT Bill by an unelected administrative state body will result in the valuation of casino gaming properties being removed from the County ratable base and would remit to the County a share of the PILOT payments which is likely to be substantially less than the amount the County would likely be paid if casino gaming properties were properly assessed under uniform assessment practices and their valuations continued to be included in the County ratable base; and

WHEREAS, implementation of these non-uniform standards will require the County to substantially increase its tax rate which will result in those increases being imposed upon all non-casino real property owners residing in the Municipality and in the other municipalities located within the County and which will be detrimental to the property tax paying citizens residing therein; and

WHEREAS, the County is preparing to file a Declaratory Judgment lawsuit to challenge the constitutionality of the PILOT Bill due to its departure from the State Constitution's uniformity provisions and other defects regarding its passage and implementation; and

WHEREAS, these matters were discussed at a meeting of the Atlantic County Mayors' Association held on April 28, 2017 at which time the members of the Association unanimously agreed to have their respective municipalities join as party plaintiffs in the legal action to be led by the County; and

WHEREAS, the County and the respective municipalities who elect to join as party plaintiffs have the same goal and interests in attacking the constitutionality of the PILOT Bill so that all party plaintiffs may be represented by a single law firm; and

WHEREAS, the Governing body of the City of Somers Point believes it to be in the best interests of its residents to join as a party plaintiff in the planned legal action.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Governing body of the City of Somers Point in the County of Atlantic, State of New Jersey that it hereby agrees to join the County as a party plaintiff in a legal action challenging the constitutionality of the PILOT Bill with the County acting as the lead plaintiff on behalf of this municipality and others, who choose to join as party plaintiffs, being represented by the same law firm, the cost of which will be borne by the County.

Old Business:

Wes Swain, City Administrator, requested from FEMA clarifications to various data regarding properties in the City. Apparently, there are approximately 100 property discrepancies between what FEMA is claiming and what Mr. Swain and Greg Schneider, City Engineer, are claiming. At this time, Mr. Swain has requested a meeting with FEMA.

New Business:

Planning Board Recommendation to City Council Regarding Zone Modifications
City Council President McGuigan mentioned that the information was received just recently.
Council President McGuigan stated that there has been no discussion regarding changing any

density requirements or restrictions. Ron Meischker, Zoning Board Chair, explained how this could lead to more density and mentioned that the Planning Board is following criteria of New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection. Councilman Smith stated that he plans to vote no. Councilman Dill believes it would be beneficial to have representatives from the Planning Board at a City Council meeting. Mayor Glasser voted against the recommendation because it is taking the review process out of the hands of the City.

City Council approved raffle and bingo licenses for the Charity League, Knights of Columbus #10220, St. Joseph Council, and Egg Harbor Township Schools, Inc., with Councilman D'Adamo recusing himself from the Knights of Columbus raffle.

Discussion of Bills:

Administrator Swain reported a bill list dated 5/9/17 in the amount of \$3,460,243.41 along with records of payments. Council President McGuigan recused himself from the bills of Concord Engineering Group.

Public Portion

Resident, Ed O'Donnell expressed his concern regarding negativity in the world. Additionally, he mentioned that Channel 10 is looking for a WaWa to broadcast their news and suggested contacting them.

Resident, Patty Cianci, expressed concern regarding the Planning Board recommendation regarding zone modification. Council President McGuigan mentioned that no formal decisions have been made. Ms. Cianci requested that the information be posted on the City's website.

Hearing nothing further from the public, accordingly the public portion was duly closed.
