## ORDINANCE NO. 9 of 2021

BOND ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR VARIOUS IMPROVEMENTS AND ACQUISITIONS IN AND BY THE CITY OF SOMERS POINT, IN THE COUNTY OF ATLANTIC, NEW JERSEY, APPROPRIATING \$1,857,700 THEREFOR AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE \$1,764,815 OF BONDS OR NOTES OF THE CITY TO FINANCE PART OF THE COST THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SOMERS POINT, IN THE COUNTY OF ATLANTIC, NEW JERSEY (not less than two-thirds of all members thereof affirmatively concurring) AS FOLLOWS:

## SECTION 1. Appropriation for Projects-Down Payment

The improvements described in Section 3 of this bond ordinance are hereby authorized to be undertaken by the City of Somers Point, Atlantic County, New Jersey (the "City"), as

general improvements. For the improvements or purposes described in Section 3, there is hereby appropriated the sum of \$1,857,700 including the sum of \$92,885 as the down payment required by the Local Bond Law. It is hereby determined and stated that the amount of the down payment is not less than five percent (5%) of the obligations authorized by this bond ordinance and that the amount appropriated as a down payment has been made available prior to final adoption of this bond ordinance by provisions in prior or current budgets of the City for capital improvements and down payments, including also monies received from the United States of America, the State of New Jersey or the County of Atlantic, or agencies thereof, as grants in aid of financing said improvements or purposes.

## SECTION 2. Authorization of Bonds and Notes

In order to finance the cost of the improvements or purposes not covered by application of the down payment, negotiable bonds are hereby authorized to be issued in the principal amount of \$1,764,815 pursuant to the Local Bond Law. In anticipation of the issuance of the bonds, negotiable bond anticipation notes are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to and within the limitations prescribed by the Local Bond Law.

## SECTION 4. Issuance of Notes

All bond anticipation notes issued hereunder shall mature at such times as may be determined by the Chief Financial Officer, provided that no note shall mature later than one year from its date. The notes shall bear interest at such rate or rates and be in such form as may be

The Chief Financial Officer shall determine all matters in connection with notes issued pursuant to this ordinance, and the Chief Financial Officer's signature upon the notes shall be conclusive evidence as to all such determinations. All notes issued hereunder may be renewed from time to time subject to the provisions of N.J.S.A. 40A:2-8(a). The Chief Financial Officer is hereby authorized to sell part or all of the notes from time to time at public or private sale and to deliver them to the purchasers thereof upon receipt of payment of the purchase price plus accrued interest from their dates to the date of delivery thereof. The Chief Financial Officer is directed to report in writing to the governing body at the meeting next succeeding the date when any sale or delivery of the notes pursuant to this ordinance is made. Such report must include the amount, the description, the interest rate, and the maturity schedule of the notes sold, the price obtained, and the name of the purchaser. If so designated by the Chief Financial Officer, the City Administrator may act on behalf of the Chief Financial Officer in any or all capacities described in this section.

## SECTION 5. Capital Budget

The applicable capital budget of the City is hereby amended to conform with the provisions of this bond ordinance to the extent of any inconsistency therewith, and the resolution promulgated by the Local Finance Board showing full detail of the amended applicable capital budget and capital program as approved by the Director of the Division of Local Government Services, is on file with the Clerk and available for inspection.

## SECTION 6. Additional Matters

The following additional matters are hereby determined, declared, recited and stated:

- (a) The improvements or purposes described in Section 3 of this bond ordinance are not current expenses. They are all improvements or purposes that the City may lawfully undertake as general improvements, and no part of the cost thereof has been or shall be specially assessed on property specially benefited thereby.
- (b) The average period of usefulness of the improvements or purposes within the limitations of the Local Bond Law, according to the reasonable life thereof computed from the date of the bonds authorized by this ordinance, is 10.05 years.
- (c) The Supplemental Debt Statement required by the Local Bond Law has been duly prepared and filed in the office of the Clerk, and an executed copy thereof has been electronically executed and filed in the office of the Director of the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs of the State of New Jersey. Such statement shows that the gross debt of the City as defined in the Local Bond Law is increased by the authorization of the bonds and notes provided for in this bond ordinance by \$1,764,815 and the obligations authorized herein will be within all debt limitations prescribed by that Law.
- (d) An aggregate amount not exceeding \$360,000 for items of expense listed in and permitted under N.J.S.A. 40A:2-20 is included in the estimated costs indicated herein for the purposes or improvements.

## SECTION 7. Application of Grants

Any grant moneys received for the purposes described in Section 3 hereof shall be applied either to direct payment of the cost of the improvements or to payment of the obligations issued pursuant to this ordinance. The amount of obligations authorized but not issued hereunder shall be reduced to the extent that such funds are so used.

## SECTION 8. Full Faith and Credit

The full faith and credit of the City are hereby pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and the interest on the obligations authorized by this bond ordinance. The obligations shall be direct, unlimited obligations of the City, and the City shall be obligated to levy ad valorem taxes upon all the taxable real property within the City for the payment of the obligations and the interest thereon without limitation of rate or amount.

## SECTION 9. Official Intent to Reimburse Expenditures

The City reasonably expects to reimburse any expenditures towards the costs of the improvements or purposes described in Section 3 of this bond ordinance and paid prior to the issuance of any bonds or notes authorized by this bond ordinance with the proceeds of such bonds or notes. No funds from sources other than the bonds or notes authorized herein has been or is reasonably expected to be reserved, allocated on a long-term basis or otherwise set aside by the City, or any member of the same "control group" as the City, within the meaning of Treasury Regulations Section 1.150-1(f), pursuant to their budget or financial policies with respect to any expenditures to be reimbursed. This Section 9 is intended to be and hereby is a declaration of the City's official intent to reimburse any expenditures towards the costs of the improvements or purposes described in Section 3 hereof to be incurred and paid prior to the issuance of bonds or notes authorized herein in accordance with Treasury Regulations Section 1.148-10 to avoid the arbitrage yield restrictions or arbitrage rebate requirements under Section 148 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended.

## SECTION 10. Tax Covenants

The City hereby covenants as follows:

(a) it shall take all actions necessary to ensure that the interest paid on the bonds or bond anticipation notes authorized by the Bond Ordinance is exempt from the gross income of the owners thereof for federal income taxation purposes, and will not become a specific item of tax preference pursuant to Section 57(a)(5) of the Code;

(b) it will not make any use of the proceeds of the bonds or bond anticipation notes or do or suffer any other action that would cause the bonds or bond anticipation notes to be "arbitrage bonds" as such term is defined in Section 148(a) of the Code and the Regulations promulgated thereunder;

(c) it shall calculate or cause to be calculated and pay, when due, the rebatable arbitrage with respect to the "gross proceeds" (as such term is used in Section 148(f) of the Code) of the bonds or bond anticipation notes;

(d) it shall timely file with the Internal Revenue Service, such information report or reports as may be required by Sections 148(f) and 149(e) of the Code; and

(e) it shall take no action that would cause the bonds or bond anticipation notes to be "federally guaranteed" within the meaning of Section 149(b) of the Code.

### SECTION 11. Ratification of Prior Acts

Any action taken by any officials of the City in connection with the improvements described in Section 3 hereof are hereby ratified and confirmed notwithstanding that such actions may have been taken prior to the effective date of this bond ordinance and shall be deemed to have been taken pursuant to this bond ordinance.

### SECTION 12. Inconsistencies

All ordinances, or parts of ordinances, inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of any such inconsistency.

### SECTION 13. Effective Date

This bond ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after the first publication thereof after final adoption as provided by the Local Bond Law.

### SECTION 1. Appropriation for Projects-Down Payment

The acquisitions or improvements described in Section 3 of this bond ordinance are hereby authorized to be undertaken by the City of Somers Point, Atlantic County, New Jersey (the "City"). For the improvements or purposes described in Section 3, there is hereby appropriated the sum of \$1,321,750. No down payment is required as the purposes authorized herein are deemed self-liquidating and the obligations authorized herein are deductible from the gross debt of the City, as more fully explained in Section 6(e) of this ordinance.

## SECTION 2. Authorization of Bonds and Notes

In order to finance the cost of the improvements or purposes, negotiable bonds are hereby authorized to be issued in the principal amount of \$1,321,750 pursuant to the Local Bond Law. They are improvements or purposes that the City may lawfully undertake as a self-liquidating purpose of a municipal public utility. No part of the cost thereof has been or shall be specially assessed on property specially benefited thereby.

(b) The period of usefulness of the improvement or purpose within the limitations of the Local Bond Law, according to the reasonable life thereof computed from the date of the bonds authorized by this bond ordinance, is 38.28 years.

(c) The Supplemental Debt Statement required by the Local Bond Law has been duly prepared and filed in the office of the Clerk, and an executed copy thereof has been electronically filed in the office of the Director of the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs of the State of New Jersey. Such statement shows that the gross debt of the City as defined in the Local Bond Law is increased by the authorization of the bonds and notes provided for in this bond ordinance by \$1,321,750, and that the net debt of the City determined as provided in the Local Bond Law is not increased by this bond ordinance. ## **Old Business:**

Short Term Rentals- Council Member McGuigan reported he has received a petition with around seventy signatures in opposition to Short-Term Rentals and Ordinances 2 and 3 of 2021. He mentioned he expects to be receiving more signatures in the coming days. On behalf of the petition signers, Council Member McGuigan requested asked the Ordinance allowing Short Term Rentals be reconsidered. He stated he will draft an Ordinance for consideration at the next meeting. Council Member McGuigan and Solicitor Smith discussed the legality of taxing short term rentals and how a mercantile license could be revoked. Council President Johnston stated City Council had previously discussed this matter for eight months, had several people from the City speak in favor of Short-Term Rentals and there was no opposition stated until after the Ordinance was passed. She stated the Ordinance did not create Short Term Rentals, it provided rules and a way to enforce them. She mentioned they are being monitored. Council Member Ferreri stated Somers Point is resort town and is in favor of Short-Term Rentals in the City. Council Member McGuigan will distribute the petition to City Council Members and will draft an Ordinance for review. Council President Johnston thanked the public for showing interest and participating.

## **Public Portion:**

The meeting was duly opened to the public.

Council President Johnston recused herself from the Public Portion regarding Greate Bay as she has a conflict. President Pro-Tempore Dill presided over this portion of the Public Hearing.

Guy Lanni of 50 Greate Bay Court stated his concerns of traffic at Route 559 and Mays Landing Road and stated his opposition to proposed development of 375 units adjacent to Greate Bay community. He asked if a recent traffic study was completed to consider the additional vehicles this development would bring to the area.

Robert S. Viola of 51 Greate Bay Court opined this proposed project will have a negative impact on the entire City. He stated his opposition to the creation 375 units in this region and urged City Council to have a traffic study completed to study the impacts this will have on an already crowded street.

Paul Striefsky, Planning Board Chair, and Solicitor Smith discussed the history of the lawsuit to the City under the COAH regulations, and the settlement from it. In order for the decision to be appealed, an appeal would have had to be filed within 45 days of the decision. Mr. Striefsky stated that the Planning Board has the ability per the decision to give a cursory review on proposed projects about traffic, safety and fire issues. Currently, there are no formal applications at the Planning Board.

Guy Lanni of 50 Greate Bay Court expressed concern regarding Planning Board applications.

Teddy O'Keefe Viola of 51 Greate Bay Court had questions regarding the court settlement and if it allows the settlement to be passed onto a new owner. She asked if the Planning Board has a right to order a traffic study be completed by the developer. She also questioned another deed restriction in place on the golf course.

Gary Best of 24 East New York Avenue questioned the deed restrictions on the property.

Thomas Collins of Platinum Car Wash stated it took him many years to put a car wash in the City, and a project like this would take much longer.

Janie Riggs of 54 East New York Avenue stated she was the Environmental Chairperson at the time of this settlement, and the committee at the time advised it was not good for environmental reasons.

Ann Marie Lucchesi of 11 Shore Road 1E thanked City Council for voting on the Short-Term Rental ordinance. She also had 10 more signatures for the petition discussed earlier in the meeting.

Charles Zuschnitt, owner of Miami Somers Company and 505 New Road LLC; Tom Collins owner of Platinum Car Wash; Chris Baliban, owner of Tight Lines Bait and Tackle; and Harvey Rovinsky, owner of Bernie Robbins Jewelers, brought up the complaints and notices they have received regarding temporary signs that they have at their businesses. They stated the signs are important to their businesses, especially after the COVID-19 pandemic.

Paul Striefsky, Planning Board Chair reported that subject of signs in the City is a topic the Planning Board is currently addressing.

Mary Sue Lovett of 118 Pleasant Avenue expressed concerns over an unlicensed Short-Term Rental property next to her home.

Patricia Pierson of 587 Mark's Road expressed her concerns regarding signs.

Hearing nothing further from the public, the public hearing was duly closed.
