No. 151 of 2010

SUBJECT: RESOLUTION CALLING ON THE STATE LEGISLATURE AND THE GOVERNOR TO ENACT PROPERTY TAX REFORM WITH PASSAGE OF THE "MUNICIPAL TOOLKIT" AND MANDATES RELIEF

INTRODUCED BY: Council President McGuigan and Councilman Dill

WHEREAS, difficult times demand difficult choices, and facing an unprecedented revenue gap this year, Governor Christie introduced, and the Legislature passed, a budget that cut municipal property tax relief funding by about \$450 million, from last year's already reduced totals; and

WHEREAS, realizing that a 20% cut in revenue replacement funding, instead of the statutorily required increase, would present a serious challenge to local budget makers, Governor Christie and the Legislature must provide local officials with meaningful tools to limit the, otherwise devastating, impact of the cuts; and

WHEREAS, the Governor's "Tool Kit to Meet Today's Fiscal Challenges" was intended to accomplish six objectives: collective bargaining reforms; limited but effective civil service and public employee pension and benefit reforms; management reform; a constitutional cap on increases in spending for direct State government services; and a constitutional cap on property tax increases; and

WHEREAS, Governor Christopher Christie and the Legislature have enacted a 2% statutory cap for annual property tax levy increases; and

WHEREAS, compliance with that cap without the "toolkit" reforms places an impossible and unworkable burden upon municipalities of this State and our citizens; and

WHEREAS, with the cuts assured in the State's new budget and with bipartisan agreement reached on new property tax caps, New Jersey Mayors - from municipalities, large and small, and from all around our Garden State - still wait for Trenton policy makers to enact meaningful local government cost containment reforms;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Governing Body of the City of Somers Point calls for immediate passage of the "Toolkit" reforms and mandates relief, including, but not limited to interest arbitration reform, limited but effective civil service and public employee pension and benefit reforms, disciplinary procedures, school and special district election reform, overdue reforms to the Fair Housing Act and the Council on Affordable Housing, and mandates relief; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that meaningful statutory arbitration reforms must limit the full economic impact of awards to conform to the 2% cap; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that statutory Health benefit reforms must conform future health benefit costs to the 2% cap; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that municipal revenues, such as the Energy Tax, which are now collected by, and diverted to, the State - but which are legally intended for municipal property tax relief in lieu of real estate taxation of utility property within a municipality - must be constitutionally dedicated for their original purpose; or in the alternative, that method of collecting such taxes should be reformed to allow imposition and collection directly by municipalities; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Administration and Legislature must advance immediate mandates relief initiatives to assist municipalities in managing within the 2% cap; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Administration and Legislature must take prompt action to enact reforms to the Fair Housing Act and the Council on Affordable Housing (COAH) which have been languishing since January without any meaningful progress; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a cap exception for the costs associated with municipal tax appeals must be included due to uncertainty of the real estate market and the ever increasing number of appeals being filed; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that those costs mandated by the Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) should be excepted from the 2% cap or the costs of new AOC mandates should be capped at 2%; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that copies of this Resolution be forwarded to New Jersey Governor Christopher Christie, to Senate President Stephen Sweeney, to Assembly Speaker Sheila Oliver, to State Senators Van Drew and Lesniak, to our two Representatives in the General Assembly, and to the New Jersey League of Municipalities.
